

Dr. William Lehr is currently the associate director of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology's research program on Internet & Telecoms Convergence (ITC, <http://itc.mit.edu>). Dr. Lehr helps manage and is a key contributor to this multidisciplinary research into the mix of technical, economic/business strategy, and public policy issues that arise as Internet infrastructure continues to evolve. Previously, Dr. Lehr was an associate research scholar and assistant professor of finance and economics in the Graduate School of Business at Columbia University. Dr. Lehr is a recognized international expert in the industry and regulatory economics of the Information and Communication Technology (ICT) industries; a frequent speaker at international academic and industry conferences; and the author of numerous research papers on such topics as Internet economics and pricing, telecommunications regulation, and the productivity effects of information technology. He is the co-editor of *Cyber Policy and Economics in an Internet Age* (Kluwer Academic Publishers, 2002) and *Internet Telephony* (MIT Press, 2001). Dr. Lehr has taught courses on media economics, telecommunications regulation, and eBusiness strategies in the United States and Europe.

In addition to his academic research, Dr. Lehr is a well-known industry consultant. He provides litigation, economic, and business strategy consulting services for firms in the information technology industries. Dr. Lehr has advised clients on strategic marketing, pricing, financial planning, and competitive strategy. Dr. Lehr has prepared expert testimony for both civil litigation and for regulatory proceedings before the FCC and numerous state commissions.

Dr. Lehr has a PhD in Economics from Stanford University (1992), an MBA in Finance from the Wharton School (1984), and MSE (1984), BA (1979), and BS (1979) degrees from the University of Pennsylvania.

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
